





CALL STATISTICS

In 2024, the Woodstock Fire/Rescue District responded to a historic **5,670 calls for service**, marking the highest volume in its history. This represents a 2.64% increase over 2023 and an impressive nearly 25% growth since 2020. This upward trend underscores the community's evolving needs and the district's unwavering commitment to meeting them effectively and efficiently.









2024 Calls By Month







5 Years Of Call Volume



MAJOR NEWS INCIDENTS

3-Alarm Barn Fire

July 01, 2024

A large barn fire broke out on Monday, July 1, at 10:25 a.m. in the 1600 block of S. Rose Farm Road in unincorporated Woodstock. Woodstock Fire/Rescue District crews arrived within six minutes to find the structure fully engulfed in flames. Strong winds, downed power lines, and the nearest fire hydrant over two miles away made the response challenging, requiring water shuttles and a 3rd Alarm request for mutual aid from fire agencies across northern Illinois. Firefighters fought the blaze defensively for 90 minutes, ultimately preventing two nearby structures from catching fire. Crews and investigators remained on the scene until 3:00 p.m. The barn, used for storage and containing no animals, was a total loss, with damages exceeding \$1,000,000. Thankfully, no injuries were reported.

Several Killed in Tragic Crash

October 27, 2024

A fatal crash on October 27 in the 13400 block of Davis Road in Woodstock left three dead and one seriously injured. Firefighters arrived within minutes to find one vehicle fully engulfed in flames and a juvenile trapped in a silver SUV. Tragically, the driver of the SUV and two occupants of a black sedan were pronounced dead at the scene.







Submerged Man Trapped Under Tractor

November 03, 2024

On November 3, firefighters rescued a man trapped under a tractor after a bridge collapse on N. Route 47. The man, suffering serious injuries and hypothermia, was airlifted to Advocate Condell Medical Center. A minor HazMat response was initiated to contain leaking fluids.

Apartment Building Fire

November 12, 2024

A late night fire broke out on November 12. 2024, in the 700 block of St. John's Road in Woodstock, heavily damaging a two-story apartment complex and displacing over 30 residents. Woodstock Fire/Rescue District crews arrived within five minutes to find heavy fire conditions, prompting a 5th Alarm request for additional resources. Firefighters battled the flames aggressively, using two tower ladders to bring the fire under control around midnight. Tragically, one resident sustained critical injuries and later passed away, while others were treated for smoke inhalation. Twelve of the 24 units sustained significant damage, with losses estimated at over \$1 million. A temporary relocation center was set up at St. John's Lutheran Church, with the American Red Cross assisting displaced residents.





SPECIALTY TEAMS

WFRD is proud to have a diverse range of specialized teams equipped to handle unique and challenging emergencies. From tactical medics embedded with law enforcement to highly trained rescue divers, hazardous materials technicians, and surface water rescue experts, these teams bring advanced skills and expertise to protect our community and beyond.

Fire Investigations

The Illinois Office of the State Fire Marshal (OSFM) requires that all fires in Illinois be investigated to determine their origin and cause. At WFRD, every team member is a Fire Investigator (FI), equipped with extensive training to conduct professional and scientifically based fire investigations.





Honor Guard

The WFRD Honor Guard was established in 2010 and consists of 9 members devoted to properly displaying the pride and colors of the Woodstock Fire/Rescue District and our country. The Honor Guard projects a positive image of the District and its members by performing as a well-trained professional team at local, state, and national events.







Tactical Emergency Medical Services (TEMS)

Through a collaborative partnership, four WFRD paramedics have joined the McHenry County SWAT team as Tactical Emergency Medical Services (TEMS) medics, providing critical support to law enforcement. These highly trained TEMS members are deployed in scenarios where traditional EMS or firefighter responses are not feasible, ensuring medical expertise is available in high-risk situations.

SPECIALITY TEAMS



Hazardous Materials (HAZMAT)

WFRD's certified technicians are highly trained to handle complex emergencies involving hazardous materials and dangerous goods. Equipped with advanced skills, they excel in tasks such as product identification, risk assessment, containment through plugging or patching, and decontamination. Whether responding to incidents within the district or providing support to neighboring communities in Lake and McHenry Counties, the team is always prepared to tackle challenging situations.

Dive & Water Rescue

WFRD boasts a highly skilled team specializing in surface rescue, underwater rescue and recovery, boat operations, and line tending. The team's rescue divers are trained to operate in diverse and challenging environments, including zero visibility conditions and ice diving. In addition to serving the local community, this team extends its expertise to other communities across northern Illinois through the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS), reinforcing regional collaboration and support during emergencies.

Technical Rescue (TRT)

The Technical Rescue Team is comprised of three highly trained firefighters who perform rescues in special situations, including rope rescue, trench collapse, structure collapse, and confined space rescues. In 2023, WFRD added one new member to the TRT team. Team members are also subject to deployment through the MABAS Divisions 4 & 5 Specialized Response Teams.







TRAINING DIVISION




Training is a year-round commitment embraced by every member of our District. From new recruits to veteran firefighters, each individual dedicates countless hours to their skills and expanding their knowledge to ensure they are prepared to handle any emergency. On average, **each member completed 256 hours of training annually or 21 hours monthly,** covering everything from fire suppression and rescue techniques to advanced medical care and specialized operations. This focus on training reflects our district's dedication to maintaining the highest standards of safety and service for the Woodstock community.


APPARATUS/VEHICLES

The Woodstock Fire/Rescue District relies on a large fleet of vehicles to serve the community effectively, making routine maintenance a top priority. In-house Mechanic Michael Shannon oversees nearly all maintenance and modifications, ensuring everything from staff vehicles to full-sized fire trucks and engines remains in peak condition and ready for any emergency. Preventive maintenance —including regular oil changes, filter replacements, and inspections of electrical and charging systems—helps minimize downtime and extend the lifespan of critical apparatus.

Every day, crews conduct inspections, equipment checks, and cleaning to uphold operational readiness. Having an in-house mechanic not only enhances fleet reliability but also saves taxpayer dollars. In 2024 alone, 987 work orders were completed, covering both preventive maintenance and necessary repairs, ensuring the district remains prepared to respond at a moment's notice.
